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Coletto Creek Bowhunt registration is open for the 2018 hunting season

Registration is open for the 2018 Coletto Creek Park and Reservoir Bowhunt. Participants need to register by noon on Friday, August 24, 2018. The bowhunts will be held over 21 consecutive weekends from Saturday, October 5, 2018 to February 22, 2019, and are restricted to the use of archery equipment only. The fee to hunt per weekend will be \$185 per hunter.

“On the first weekend of archery season, legal hunting is only allowed on Saturday and Sunday,” said Curtis Seiler, chief ranger at Coletto Creek Park and Reservoir. “For the remaining weekends, hunters selected by random drawing will be allowed to pre-scout and begin hunting assigned areas the Friday of their hunting weekend through Sunday.”

GBRA utilizes 1,500 acres in the bowhunt, which are divided into five different hunting areas. Hunters may apply individually or as an even numbered group up to 10 in each party. Each individual or group will be assigned a specific hunt area based on the size of their group and the order of draw. Hunters will be allowed to harvest two antlerless deer and an unlimited number of feral hogs.

To enter the random drawing for the hunts, email or send a postcard that includes a name, address, daytime phone number, email address and names of those in the hunting party (maximum of 10); preferred hunt date(s) and hunting area request. You can also drop off your entry postcard at the Coletto Creek Park office located at 365 Coletto Park Rd, Victoria, TX. Only those applicants drawn will be notified of the results.

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About the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority

GBRA was established by the Texas Legislature in 1933 as a water conservation and reclamation district. GBRA provides stewardship for the water resources in its 10-county statutory district, which begins near the headwaters of the Guadalupe and Blanco rivers, ends at San Antonio Bay, and includes Kendall, Comal, Hays, Caldwell, Guadalupe, Gonzales, DeWitt, Victoria, Calhoun, and Refugio counties. GBRA provides services that include hydroelectric generation; water and wastewater treatment; municipal, industrial, and agricultural raw water supply; and recreational operations.
